

# Report from the Chair



Victorian Order of Nurses celebrated its 125th anniversary in 2022. Over the years, it has become the largest provider of home and community care services across Ontario. VON has always been a pioneer, offering innovative healthcare programs and services such as prenatal education, well-baby clinics, school health services and coordinated home programs. It continues to be a leader and this year VON Canada joined with three other leading home care organizations to present a policy paper to the Ontario government articulating how a partnership between policy makers, funders, providers, and provider organizations could come together to develop the vast potential of the home care sector and ensure that Ontarians are offered the opportunity to age well at home, with appropriate supports the proposal was well received, and the sector received increased funding in the 2023 Ontario budget.

Middlesex-Elgin is the largest VON site, offering a broad range of home and community care services. Our dedicated staff and volunteers are recognized as innovators and leaders within the organization. We continue to offer Innovation Grants to encourage our staff to develop their ideas on how we can improve on the delivery of services. Many of the programs first developed here in Middlesex-Elgin by both staff and volunteers have been adopted system wide by VON.

Our VON volunteers help make a difference in the community by sharing their time and caring for others. A sampling of their roles include:

- · Transportation: they drive clients to medical appointments, the grocery store, or social activities and programs.
- · Volunteer visiting: they brighten the day of an isolated senior, physically disabled adult, or person with Alzheimer's or dementia by visiting them in person or virtually.
- Security checks / reassurance calls: they provide a supportive and uplifting daily phone call to make sure clients are safe and healthy.
- · Adult day program: they assist VON staff in organizing and delivering fun and engaging activities for clients.
- Meals on Wheels: Deliver hot or frozen meals in the community while providing a friendly check-in, take clients meal orders via phone or help to pack meals for delivery.

We are not without our challenges, one of the largest of which continues to be the recruitment and retention of staff. Another challenge is the disparate systems we rely on. With some health records still paper based and some electronic, it lends to many inefficiencies. In 2022, we embarked on a digital transformation project. We selected a digital health solution that is secure, offers accurate and accessible information and that will help us build and share repeatable processes – saving time, increasing safety, and improving the care we offer. We will all benefit from this digital transformation – our clients and their families will find it easier to be involved in their care, it will support the recruitment and retention of staff, and it will help our organization bring more home and community care to more people in the in the province.

I want to say thank you to the staff and volunteers who make VON Middlesex-Elgin such an incredible organization. We strive to help clients stay healthy, live well, and remain active. Together we make every day as full of meaning and hope as possible.

2022 was a very hard year for all of us, it was a hard year for me. We were finally able to lift some of the restrictions placed on us because of the pandemic, but nothing could really lift the weight off of me because of some personal things I was going through.

But, I had learned that often isolation is the worst enemy of a broken spirit, so I continued on in my role as a volunteer with the VON Friendly Visiting program. Every Wednesday morning, initially by phone, then finally in person, I met with a wonderful woman who had recently moved to our community.

Every Wednesday I could step out of my misery (I truly can be a real drama queen!) and into her world. Every Wednesday I could visit her, hear about her joys and struggles, her family, her grandchildren, her life before coming to Strathroy. And every Wednesday, for that visit, which initially might be a 30-minute phone call, but over the course of the year became a three-hour visit, I found true joy and could laugh again. That joy filtered into the rest of my day and soon started to filter into the rest of my week.



One day in November, as I was leaving, she said she wakes up Wednesdays and is so happy because she knows I am coming. I could honestly tell her that I felt the same. She didn't know what my year had been like, but in giving of myself I got so much more in return. She didn't know that in a very tangible way it felt like I had my mom back - she had so many similar mannerisms, and gave the same soul filling, super-sized, all-encompassing hugs.

We don't volunteer to resurrect people from our past, or to fill our emotional needs, but our visits gave me a touch of both. On December 13, 2022 I got a phone call, from her son, that she had passed away very suddenly. That is the hardest part of volunteering, because our clients can become our friends.

We don't necessarily have to volunteer with a given society or group, but when we make the conscious choice to volunteer with VON there is a double positive effect - the prospective client is given our time, energy and enthusiasm and we in turn will always be affected and blessed by theirs.

The challenge this year will provide an opportunity to highlight some of the VON community services through staging the largest SMART exercise class, in addition to an accessible trail walk, scavenger hunt, and community BBQ. The Activity Challenge is open to anyone of any age and ability and we look forward to many of our community partners joining us to reach our exciting goal.

The Ailsa Craig breakfast is on again for June 4th, and we always look forward to that special event. We are so grateful for the support of the local community and the dedication of an amazing volunteer team who put their heart and soul into this event on behalf of local VON services.



The board was able to re-purpose certain funds near the end of the fiscal year to facilitate the purchase of a new accessible vehicle for Middlesex Elgin VON, demonstrating the ongoing need for client safety.

After considerable lobbying by VON Canada, and the Community Relations and Advocacy Committee, we saw promises of change by the provincial government with respect to home health care funding over the next budget period.

We look forward to the future with confidence, recognizing the challenges and knowing that VON Middlesex-Elgin will continue to meet the needs of our clients, patients and families.




